It's important for parents to understand

the intent and content of the Gifted and Talented (G&T) test to best prepare their child for the entrance exam. Some exams may even consist of several components such as the Otis-Lennon School Ability Test (OLSAT), the Naglieri Nonverbal Ability Test 2 (NNAT2), and the Cognitive Abilities Test (COGAT). The NNAT2 tests students' nonverbal problem-solving skills such as: Abilities to perform Spatial Visualization, Serial Reasoning, Pattern Completion, and Reasoning by Analogy. The COGAT test

measures students' Reasoning Abilities in the three areas that are linked to academic success: Verbal Reasoning, Non-Verbal Reasoning, and Quantitative Reasoning. How to Prepare There are two sets of challenges your child will face when taking the G&T exam. The first and most important one is the test of their problem solving abilities and their knowledge of foundational concepts. The second challenge they face is being able to perform their skills in an unfamiliar setting and format. Test preparation booklets can only familiarize your child with the exam format.
